While this Christmas <u>will</u> be different from those past, it is in ways we <u>never</u> could have imagined. The world has been turned completely upside down. We've been robbed of those precious moments that center us, including the ways we worship during Advent and Christmas. We will miss the cherished, familiar traditions and rituals.

In the midst of this upheaval, where <u>do</u> we find Christmas? For me, the answer comes in the **stories**. They were originally told to listeners who understood shepherds and sheep, magi and camels, angels and stars as symbolic, in ways we do not. For those listeners, the stories were unencumbered by centuries during which the stories became charming heart-warmers from an ancient past. So, I am led to ask: What is the essential truth of these stories? How do they speak to us and to the world **now**?


When we dig deeper into the stories, they are about oppression, misuse and abuse of power, poverty and the systemic structures that keep people poor. They are about fear and displacement, refugees and discrimination. Their meaning and relevance to the 21st century is apparent and undeniable.

Importantly, the stories remind us of how to navigate through the world, as it was then and is now. As people of faith, we believe in hope, love, and justice. Trust in God leads us to live differently in the world: speaking truth to power, giving voice to the disenfranchised, and living in right relationship with our neighbours.

Even in these, for us unusually, tumultuous times, the true story of Christmas is the one that comes alive **in and through us** into the 21st century world we find ourselves.

This Christmas, may you have hope and health and be a beacon of love and peace.

He came to the church, at least the vacant lot where the church had once stood. No church now: only a sign in the centre of the lot. Going nearer to it he read the words, "If I had not come". Suddenly the meaning of it all dawned on the puzzled boy, and he said, Oh, I know. "If I had not come" – that's why there's no Christmas Day or any Church."

Covid or not - Christmas Day will come. We will remember the birth of Christ. We will rejoice that God's Love – through his Son – continues to be our support and strength for all of life's challenges.

This Christmas I will again say – "Thank you, Jesus, that you did come".

God did bring us hope as God promised us, through a child born in Bethlehem, that we are not alone. God will always be with us in all circumstances of life, for we are loved. All of us.

So, as you get closer to December 25th, look to the sky and follow the Star of David. Journey to the place where the light of Christ will brightly penetrate your heart and your soul. Feel the Spirt of the Lord with HOPE, PEACE, JOY AND LOVE.

Finance and Stewardship Team Report

Thank you to everyone for your support to Central including financial. We ran a surplus in October of slightly over \$3,000 with the help of donations from the Don't Bake/Sew Donate Bazaar campaign. The meat pies, and on-line Bazaar and Silent action are proving to be great fundraisers as well! Thank you all! Your support provides the foundation that keeps our staff and facilities available to serve our community as creatively as possible during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Our General Fund deficit is sitting at \$40,139 by the end of October. Recently the Federal Government has increased the Canadian Emergency Business Account from \$40,000 to \$60,000 and the non-repayable part (grant) from \$10,000 to \$20,000. The church council has approved applying for the maximum available. We continue to work on the paperwork that could provide up to \$15.000 of additional government rebates for the wages that we have paid during these COVID-19 times.

Unfortunately, we were unsuccessful in our grant application for additional funds for replacing our aging lift. We will keep looking for other grant possibilities.

On that first Christmas Mary and Joseph faced a world of uncertainties and yet, with trust in God, they moved forward with their lives.

We invite you to consider a Christmas giving at this time and an envelope is enclosed. May you recognize, find, and create Joy over this Christmas season.


